LD AN ACT CONCERNING RAISING WILD BIRDS AND WILD 1851 ANIMALS IN CAPTIVITY.

Sponsor: JACQUES Committee Report: New draft of LD 42

<u>SUMMARY:</u> This bill originally added cats to the section involving nuisance dogs, allowing landowners to kill nuisance cats molesting or attacking livestock, domestic animals or poultry. It also included wild birds and animals raised in captivity with the other domestic animals a person can protect against nuisance dogs and cats. The term "exotic" was defined, and exotic animals exempted from banding requirements. The bill generated considerable controversy over the provisions involving domestic cats.

The bill was introduced to address specific problems experienced by licensed breeders within the State. They often have valuable birds, animals or eggs in their care and no recourse against cats who molest or kill them. The new draft made the owner or keeper of a domestic cat guilty of not controlling a nuisance cat if it kills or molests captive wild birds or animals owned by a licensed breeder. A \$50 to \$100 penalty was proposed for this violation as well as making the cat owner liable for damages and court costs.

The bill was indefinitely postponed in both the House and the Senate as the concerns were addressed in the recodification of the Animal Welfare Statutes. A provision of LD 811 provided that owners of animals inflicting damage on another's property be held liable for those damages.

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
