## SUMMARY

This bill proposed to extend the timeframe during which the commissioner may establish the annual deer hunting season. Currently, the department has a five week window in which to set the season. Traditionally, they have established a four week season beginning on the fourth Monday before Thanksgiving and ending on the Saturday following Thanksgiving. In some years, this calendar overlaps with the October trapping season and grouse-hunting season. This bill would have eliminated the conflicts between deer-hunters and various other user groups by moving the season back one week. This change also would increase the chances for hunters to track deer on snow, which many deer hunters prefer.

Sporting camp owners pointed out that with the current four week season, they are unable to fill Thanksgiving week. If the season was moved back one week, they felt they would only be able to fill their camps for two weeks.
