SUMMARY

The bill, as amended, addresses the difficulty nursing homes are experiencing in recruiting and retaining qualified nonhealth personnel by providing an interim wage adjustment for those personnel when appropriate. The adjustment shall equalize the imbalances in wages which have been exaggerated by the across-the-board percentage wage increases to account for inflation. For example, those who started at the lowest salary will get the most increase. Wage adjustments are only available for those nursing homes which have passed along the previous adjustments for inflation. In addition, nursing homes are required to show inability to compete for wages in the labor market and have a hardship in recruiting and retaining staff.

This bill sought to provide \$500,000 to the Bureau of Mental Health to expand mental health aftercare services. The bill, which was withdrawn, served as the basis for a letter to the Commissioner of the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation encouraging the department to develop a community health system that will assure more mental health aftercare services.
