SUMMARY

This bill amends the Maine Student Incentive Scholarship Program to provide that funds appropriated to the program shall not lapse but shall be carried forward for use in the program.

The committee amendment adds an emergency clause, emergency preamble and a fiscal note to the bill.

SUMMARY

This bill provides a mechanism and incentive for school administrative units to establish school-based child care services for the children of students and school employees. Schools which offer day care programs under this bill are to provide parenting education and child development training to student parents. Costs not covered by fees are subsidizable as program costs under the School Finance Act.

The committee amendment limits the subsidization of a school's costs to those costs associated with providing child care for the children of students

enrolled in the school. It requires fees to be charged to cover the costs of providing child care to school employees. The amendment also clarifies that any student, regardless of grade level, would be eligible to use day care services provided by that student's school unit. Finally, the amendment directs the Department of Educational and Cultural Services to collect data necessary for assessment of the program and to report to the Joint Standing Committee on Education by January 15, 1990.

SUMMARY

The original bill would have required school administrative units in conducting a diagnosis and evaluation of children suspected of having a handicapping condition to use a multidisciplinary assessment employing appropriately trained and licensed professionals. The bill would also have required units to assure face-to-face presentation of assessment results to parents and assured compensation to specialists used by the pupil evaluation team in performing the assessment, including supervision fees for psychological examiners.

The committee amendment would have struck the content of the bill and established the Interdisciplinary Advisory Committee on Special Education Assessment to advise the Legislature and the commissioner on the assessment of children with exceptional needs. The members were to be appointed by the commissioner and report by January 15, 1989.

The Senate amendment would have added a representative of the Maine Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers to the advisory committee.

SUMMARY

To help school administrative units deal with expensive out-of-district special education placements, this bill sets a cap on the cost of those placements to local units and requires the State to pay the costs which exceed that cap. The original bill established the cap at two times the average secondary school per pupil operating costs. Tuition, treatment and room and board costs were included within the cap.
