The amendment also clarifies that any student, regardless of grade level, would be eligible to use day care services provided by that student's school unit. Finally, the amendment directs the Department of Educational and Cultural Services to collect data necessary for assessment of the program and to report to the Joint Standing Committee on Education by January 15, 1990.

#### SUMMARY

The original bill would have required school administrative units in conducting a diagnosis and evaluation of children suspected of having a handicapping condition to use a multidisciplinary assessment employing appropriately trained and licensed professionals. The bill would also have required units to assure face-to-face presentation of assessment results to parents and assured compensation to specialists used by the pupil evaluation team in performing the assessment, including supervision fees for psychological examiners.

The committee amendment would have struck the content of the bill and established the Interdisciplinary Advisory Committee on Special Education Assessment to advise the Legislature and the commissioner on the assessment of children with exceptional needs. The members were to be appointed by the commissioner and report by January 15, 1989.

The Senate amendment would have added a representative of the Maine Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers to the advisory committee.

### SUMMARY

To help school administrative units deal with expensive out-of-district special education placements, this bill sets a cap on the cost of those placements to local units and requires the State to pay the costs which exceed that cap. The original bill established the cap at two times the average secondary school per pupil operating costs. Tuition, treatment and room and board costs were included within the cap.

Office of Policy and Legal Analysis.....page 8 Education The committee amendment raises the cap to three times the secondary foundation per pupil operation rate and limits its application to room and board and tuition costs.

The Senate amendment delays implementation of the bill until 1989-90, adds language to phase in provisions of the bill by prorating available funds and adds a fiscal note.

An entry was added to the second errors bill (LD 2657) to correct a cross reference and other language in the Senate amendment.

#### SUMMARY

This bill was introduced to implement the recommendations of the Task Force on School Funding. It provided for: (1) maintaining the State share of operating costs in future years at no less than the 1988-89 percentage, (2) updating 2 year old operating and program costs in a more realistic manner, (3) guaranteeing that each unit will receive at least 75% of what it received for operating costs in the previous year and that some "at risk" units will receive 90%, and (4) guaranteeing that each unit will receive at least 5% of its operating costs in State aid each year. In amended form, this bill served as the committee's minority report on school funding.

The committee amendment would have required that, except in unusual circumstances, the 2 year old base year costs be adjusted by at least the average increase in education costs over the last two years. The amendment also would have provided for any additional funds, up to \$11 million, available for education subsidy to be distributed through the updating adjustment.
