This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The summaries are arranged by LD number under each committee.

All Adopted Amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H-584 or S-222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action is listed to the right of the title. If final House and Senate action differ, both are listed. Committee Reports and Floor Action are indicated as follows::

Regulation to study ways to increase the supply of reimbursable mental health professionals. Special emphasis was placed on expanding the kinds of professionals who may receive third-party reimbursement.

The new draft expanded the study to determine the extent and nature of the need for more mental health care professionals. It also divided the study between the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation and the Department of Professional and Financial Regulation. The former is to determine whether there was a need and suggest solutions if needed. The latter is to determine the cost.

SUMMARY

New Draft Of LD 2384

The main intent of both the original bill and the new draft was to limit the possibility of hostile takeovers. The new draft limited the ability of individuals who, after the effective date of this Act, come to own 25% or more of the stock in that company from voting on any new "business combination" proposed for the company. In order to enter into a business combination, 2/3rds of the remaining shareholders in the company would have to approve. The bill also defines affiliate and associate and limits the voting rights of those who are affiliates or associates of a shareholder holding 25% or more of the stock in a company.

2603 Ladders of Advancement in the Nursing Profession

SUMMARY

This bill would have provided scholarships for nursing students who enroll in certified nursing assistant (CNA) courses which can be used for advanced placement if the students decide to continue their education toward a practical nurse (PN) degree. It also would have encouraged the Maine Vocational-Technical Institute System to develop coordinated CNA and PN

programs to enhance the career ladder options of nurses. The Maine Vocational-Technical Institute System board of trustees would have been required to make a report to the Legislature. The career ladder and scholarship provisions were to have been sunseted on June 30, 1989. (See also LD 2280)

SUMMARY

New Draft Of LD 2073

At present the responsibility for licensing welders and governing welding be placed in the Department of Labor. The responsibility is presently divided between the Department of Labor for welds on boilers and the Department of Transportation for welds on bridges.

The original bill would have given the Department of Labor the responsibility of establishing rules for licensing welders by either department.

The new draft would have established a commission to study the issue and make recommendations to the next legislature.
