This bill would have eliminated the statewide reservation system for state parks with overnight camping facilities. Proponents for the bill wanted a first-come, first-serve reservation system.

#### SUMMARY

This bill permits the Bureau of Forestry to lease out the state nursery to produce commercial tree seedlings. The nursery was no longer operating at a profit. The leasee will pay the state \$25,000 per year. Senate amendment B (S-13) added a fiscal note and removed the emergency preamble because the bill involved a lease arrangement of more than 5 years duration.

## SUMMARY

This bill clarifies statutory language for the enforcement of forest fire laws by forest rangers of the Maine Bureau of Forestry. Forest rangers have encountered technical problems while enforcing fire control laws. This bill addresses some of those problems. Committee amendment B (H-135) removed sections of the bill that amended the Maine Criminal Code and allows the court to require restitution costs to be paid by violators. House amendment B (H-180) defines the term, "power-driven equipment". The amendment also prohibits the operation of such equipment within 1000 feet of a forest when the equipment does not have a spark arrestor.
