SUMMARY

BRAWN

Last year legislation was enacted which replaced one member of the advisory council to the Department of Marine Resources with the chair of the Lobster Advisory Council as soon as a vacancy appeared on the advisory council. If that legislation had been implemented as enacted it would have created an imbalance in representation by the various commercial or industrial marine resources interests over which the department has jurisdiction. Adequate representation is required by law. This law made the chair of the Lobster Advisory Council a 10th nonvoting member of the advisory council until November 1989. When the next vacancies occur on the advisory council, the chair of the Lobster Advisory Council becomes a voting member of the advisory council and the membership returns to 9 members.

SUMMARY

This law established the Marine Products Seafood Marketing Program to create directed and specific markets into which Maine seafood is sold. The benefits of the publicly supported promotional and seafood merchandizing programs may be significantly enhanced by direct support from Maine producer program participants. It also expanded the voluntary fishery product inspection program to include voluntary inspection of shellfish as well as fish products, allowing for expansion of the program within the guidelines set by the National Shellfish Sanitation Program and the National Marine Fisheries Services.
