#### <u>SUMMARY</u>

This bill would have authorized the Joint Standing Committee on Utilities to study a recently promulgated rule by the Public Utilities Commission concerning competition among telephone service providers. Of particular concern was the effect the rule would have on private companies which purchase various reduced rate intra-state long distance services, such as WATTs lines, and sell (or resell) access to these services to smaller consumers.

Given an ongoing case in front of the Public Utilities Commission regarding one of the companies reselling services, the committee requested and was granted permission to hold the bill over until next session.
