All Adopted Amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H-584 or S-222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action is listed to the right of the title. If final House and Senate action differ, both are listed. Committee Reports and Floor Action are abbreviated as follows:

SUMMARY

The Maine Blueberry Commission is responsible for determining how the Maine Blueberry Tax is allocated between research and development and promotion. The commission consists of 5 processors and 3 growers, all of whom are appointed by the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources for a term of 4 years.

The bill would have required that the 3 grower members of the Maine Blueberry Commission be elected rather than appointed. For the purposes of the election, the State would have been divided into 3 districts and growers in each district would elect a grower from that district to membership on the commission. The term for commission membership would have been 3 years.

SUMMARY

The bill amended provisions of existing law governing general use pesticide dealers to require licensed dealers to submit annual reports to the Board of Pesticides Control on sales of general use pesticides. Reports would include the total volume sold of Sevin (Carbaryl), 2,4D, Diazinone, Malathion or any combination of these pesticides, including their active ingredients.

The bill also resolved a conflict created by 2 public laws enacted in 1988 that used the same section number for different purposes.

The committee amendment changed the reporting requirement to limit reports to sales in excess of one quart or 5 pounds. It also added aerosol products and general use paints, stains, wood preservatives and sealants to the list of items exempt from the reporting requirements.
