#### SUMMARY

LD 302 proposed to broaden and "deepen" conflict of interest and disclosure provisions with respect to public officials. LD 302 proposed to regulate certain activities of legislators, former legislators, executive employees, elected county officers, and elected municipal officers. The bill proposed:

- A revolving door provision for former legislators by restricting their lobbying activities following their departure from the Legislature;
- 2. Disclosure of sources of income accounting for 10% or more of the total income of elected state, county, and municipal officers according to ranges of income;
- Disclosure of positions on any board of directors held by elected state, county, and municipal officers:
