### SUMMARY

This bill would permit intermediate care facilities for the mentally retarded to choose once every five years to have their reimbursement rates calculated on a new base year.

The bill was carried over to permit time to evaluate the effectiveness of new principles of reimbursement recently adopted by the Department of Human Services.

## SUMMARY

The original bill requires hospitals to notify emergency medical services personnel if there is any communicable disease transmission risk created by a patient who has been or will be transported by emergency medical services personnel. The bill makes it a civil violation if a hospital fails to comply with the requirements imposed by the bill.

The Committee Amendment (H-213) amends the laws relating to AIDS to include emergency medical services personnel, law enforcement officers and firefighters to the groups of people, exposed to blood of body fluids of a patient in a health care facility, who may petition the District Court to require the patient in question to submit to an HIV test provided that certain conditions have been met.
