LD 350 An Act Concerning the Purchase of Real Estate by the State or Local Housing Authorities

SUMMARY

LD 350 required that prior to the acquisition of property within a municipality by the state or local housing authority, the municipal legislative body must approve the acquisition by affirmative vote.

The bill failed to obtain Committee approval because of the serious obstacles it would create to the development of affordable housing. In addition, testimony at the hearing indicated that the problem was associated with only 1 local housing authority and involved only 1 purchase.

SUMMARY

LD 372 proposed that the Maine State Housing Authority issue taxable bonds under the Housing Opportunities for Maine Program, HOME, to assist persons in moderate income households who do not qualify for assistance under nontaxable bond financing. Currently, the HOME Program has been financed primarily by the issue of nontaxable bonds. The United States Internal Revenue Service rules establish an income ceiling of \$32,000 for a family of 4. York and Cumberland counties have been granted an exception.

LD 3721 provides taxable bond financing to persons with a moderate household income as defined by the authority and which exceeds the income limits of tax-free bond financing.

Provisions to assist moderate income households with home purchases have been included in LD 1765, the Committee bill on affordable housing.

LD 451 An Act to Create an Educational Bonus for Affordable Housing CARRIED OVER ECON/DEV COMM

LD 451 proposed to provide grants of \$2,000 to municipalities for each unit of affordable housing created in each municipality.

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- A. A housing unit is affordable if:
 - 1) monthly rent or mortgage does not exceed 30% of gross monthly income of purchaser/renter;
 - 2) income of renter/purchaser meets guidelines of Dept. of Economic and Community Development (DECD);
 - 3) deed or covenant preserves unit as a unit of affordable housing for 10 years after municipality receives the grant.
- B. Counties would be limited to a maximum amount of grant money determined by the percentage of the total number of eligible units in that county, and this percentage cannot exceed the percentage of the total number of kindergarten through 12 grade students in that county.
- C. The grants could be used only to provide public education.

As a result of limited funds, the committee decided to consider this issue in its study of obstacles to affordable housing.

LD 456 An Act to End Homelessness in Maine

SUMMARY

LD 456 established the 8 member Interagency Committee on Homelessness to inventory the availability of resources available to the homeless, to coordinate the delivery of federal funds and to make the best use of federal funds, would allow, would allow homeless shelters access to surplus state property and equipment.

Proposed \$1,000,000 for temporary assistance to last resort to people in danger of foreclosure or eviction - MSHA.

Proposed \$600,000 for creation of transitional housing units for the homeless - MSHA.

Proposed \$500,000 to Department of Human Services for cost reimbursement to sponsors of emergency housing shelters for homeless.

The concept of the bill was included in the Committee's Affordable Housing Partnership Act bill, LD 1765.
