#### An Act to Change the Number of Rooms Required for Hotel Liquor Licenses

SUMMARY

This bill changes from 14 to 12 the number of sleeping rooms a hotel in a town of less than 3,000 souls must have to obtain a hotel liquor license authorizing service of liquor for consumption in guests' rooms.

SUMMARY

This bill allows hotels and Class A restaurants licensed to serve alcoholic beverages to extend credit, without the use of a credit card, for alcoholic beverages served at a private, prearranged function, such as a wedding reception.

LD 545 An Act to Clarify Election Law Procedures PUBLIC 166

SUMMARY

This bill makes a number of technical corrections and changes to the election laws. The bill makes several changes necessary to conform State law to federal law regarding the balloting procedures of the electoral college and absentee ballots. The bill makes the Commission on Governmental Ethics and Election Practices solely responsible for preparation and distribution of candidates reporting forms. The bill also clarifies that challenges to primary and nomination petitions must be filed by the 5th business day after the petition filing deadline.

Committee Amendment "A" clarifies that candidates seeking office as non-party candidates must not have been enrolled in a party for 3 months prior to the filing deadline for nomination petitions. The amendment creates an exception from this rule for county charter commission candidates since their's is a non-partisan office. The amendment also strikes language in the bill that would allow overseas voters voting absentee to vote for candidates for State offices by writing in the name of a political party only rather than the name of a person.
