## SUMMARY

The purpose of this bill was to specify the law enforcement powers of game wardens with regard to searches and seizures. The bill would have made game wardens' duty to comply with the United States Constitution Fourth Amendment principles governing searches and seizures, including arrests and investigatory stops, express in law. The current law is susceptible to a reading which grants game wardens unconstitutionally broad search and seizure authority. As a result, the current law provided insufficient guidance to game wardens.

This bill, as amended, repealed the current unconstitutional provisions in the law concerning the game wardens' powers to stop and search a vehicle and arrest persons in the vehicle when they suspect a violation of the fish and game laws, but did not enact any new search and seizure provisions.
