## An Act to Establish Occupational Health and Safety Standards for Operators of Video Display Terminals

#### SUMMARY

LD 661 proposed to regulate the use of video display terminals by employers who used 5 or more terminals throughout the State. These employers were required to provide any employee who used a terminal for more than 4 hours per day with fully adjustable work stations, detachable keyboards, copyholders, indirect lighting fixtures, glare filters, a 15-minute rest break every 2 hours, annual vision examinations and education and training regarding potential health hazards associated with VDT use. The employer was also required to provide semi-annual terminal maintenance for all VDT's.

Committee Amendment "A" (H-563) replaced the bill and required employers with 25 or more terminals statewide to provide operators (employees who used a terminal for more than 4 consecutive hours on a daily basis) with swivel chairs and height-adjustable seats or terminal tables unless declined by the operator. The employer was required to take remedial actions to reduce screen glare and if these measures proved ineffective, to provide a glare filter for the terminal screen. Operators were entitled to a 15-minute rest break every 2 hours and annual paid leave to receive vision examinations at their own expense. The employer was also required to provide education and training to operators regarding the proper use of VDT's. The amendment also added an appropriation section and fiscal note.

Committee of Conference Amendment "A" to Committee Amendment "A" (S-402) replaced the bill and only requires employers with 25 or more VDT's in a single location to provide education and training to VDT operators.
