SUMMARY

This bill proposed to exempt homeowners from the requirement to remove an abandoned #2 fuel oil tank when removal is not physically possible or practicable because the tank holds less than 500 gallons, when the tank is located in a municipality of 10,000 or more persons and when the abutting properties are served by both public water and public sewer. The Committee voted not to pass the bill.

SUMMARY

More consistent shoreland zoning around sensitive great ponds is the focus of the original bill and this amendment. It allows the Board of Environmental Protection to extend more stringent shoreland zoning regulations to all municipalities abutting a great pond that warrant special water quality considerations if those ordinances are imposed on one municipality. The committee amendment (S-72) clarified the intent of the bill and added a fiscal note.
