SUMMARY

This bill would have created the Youth-at-Risk Alternative Education Program to help school units address middle and high school dropout rates. The program would have consisted of a grant program to schools to plan for and to implement dropout prevention programs.

The committee amendment clarified the grants process and the definition of "at-risk youth" and made clear that the program applies to grades 5 through 12.

The bill was held over in the Appropriations Committee.

SUMMARY

This bill relates to approval of budgets in community school districts. The bill would require district school committees to submit copies of articles to be included in a budget warrant to municipal officers of each municipality in the district 30 days before the printing of the warrants. Municipal officers would then have 20 days to review the proposal. If municipal officers had a joint recommendation to make regarding the proposal, that joint recommendation would be included on the warrant.

This bill allows the Maine Educational Loan Authority to expand its supplemental loan program to include students at Maine proprietary schools, who were previously ineligible.

The committee amendment extends availability of MELA loans to Maine students attending out-of-state proprietary institutions for which loan guarantee services are readily available.
