## JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE BILL SUMMARIES AUGUST 1989

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The summaries are arranged by LD number for each committee.

All Adopted Amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H-584 or S-222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action is listed to the right of the title. If final House and Senate action differ, both are listed. Committee Reports and Floor Action are abbreviated as follows:

OTP-ND-NT	Ought to Pass in New Draft, New Title
OTP-A	Ought to Pass as Amended

#### SUMMARY

The bill required that fresh produce imported from a foreign country bear a country-of-origin label if that country allows the application of pesticides to produce that are banned in the United States or the rate or manner of application of which is not allowed under federal law.

The committee amendment reduced the penalty for not labeling produce originating in certain countries from a Class E crime to a civil penalty with a fine of not more than \$100 and added language repealing the law on July 1, 1991.

The Senate Amendment removed a food inspector position and reduced funding for an educational program to \$5,000.

LD 811 An Act to Simplify Pesticide Inventory Requirements LV/WD

#### SUMMARY

The bill would have simplified the pesticide inventory requirements by defining terms and imposing and clarifying the licensing and record keeping requirements on pesticide dealers. See LD 179 for committee action on this issue.

SUMMARY

The bill clarified the power of the Maine Milk Commission to enter into multistate compacts for the purpose of setting minimum milk prices. It specifically gave the commission authority to enter the Northeast Interstate Dairy Compact.

The committee amendment retains the purpose of the original bill and directs the Maine Milk Commission to enter into the Northeast Interstate Dairy Compact when the compact is ratified by 3 other states and approved by Congress.

H-450 clarifies that the Milk Commission's price-setting will not be delegated to the Northeast Interstate Dairy Compact.

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
