The original bill repealed existing statutes that provide a process for causing a dangerous dog to be muzzled, otherwise restrained or put to sleep and replaced them with more extensive provisions.

The committee amendment replaces the original bill and amends existing statute to allow a person witnessing an unprovoked assault by a dog to bring a complaint to law enforcement officials. If investigation by a law enforcement officer and court action concurred, this amendment would allow the appropriate restraint of a dangerous dog in cases where the person assaulted may be reluctant to file a complaint.

SUMMARY

The committee amendment retained the purpose of the original bill giving the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources authority to promulgate rules governing the labeling of foods as "organic." Statutory provisions that made violations of organic labeling laws a Class E crime were repealed. Bill language that made violations of organic labeling laws a civil violation was amended to limit the maximum penalty to \$1,000.

The Senate amendment corrected provisions of the bill that inadvertently gave the department the ability to determine and impose fines for a civil violation.

The bill did not receive \$2,000 for rulemaking and was indefinitely postponed.
