This comprehensive solid waste legislation was submitted by the Governor. It addresses virtually all aspects of the solid waste issue. Most of its provisions were incorporated in some form in the committee's solid waste legislation, LD 1431.

SUMMARY

This bill would have deleted the reference to pathogenic and infectious wastes in the hazardous waste statutes and included these materials under the definition of special waste. The bill also included authority for the Board of Environmental Protection to adopt rules to govern the management and disposal of biomedical waste. The committee voted not to pass this bill in favor of LD 692.

Advance disposal fees would have been established on tires, batteries, white goods and brown goods to finance the program.
