SUMMARY

LD 962 proposed to require:

- A. The Director of the Bureau of Public Lands to notify the general public and all members of a local legislative body of any state agency's consideration of local land for acquisition.
- B. Notice to the general public by newspaper advertising about possible State acquisition of local land.
- C. Notice by first class mail to local legislative bodies concerning local land acquisition.

LD 962 did not require local approval of state land acquisitions.

The bill failed to obtain Committee approval because of the disadvantages that the State would incur as a result of the bill's passage. The bill was withdrawn in order for the sponsors to address the problems it raised. The sponsors intend to introduce the bill again to a future legislative session.

LD 973 proposed that the Bureau of Human Resources:

- A. Study data entry job classifications and levels of compensation for these job classifications on the state, local, and federal levels:
- B. Study knowledge and skill requirements for data entry functions;
- C. Study career opportunities available to data entry personnel; and
- D. Determine any changes necessary in classifications and compensation levels.

The bill failed to obtain committee approval because the Bureau of Human Resources and organizations representing state employees are required by law to negotiate job classification standards. The State and State employee unions are involved in these negotiations which includes an analysis of the issues proposed in LD 973.
