SUMMARY

This bill was concerned with the transfer of prisoners from county jails either to state facilities or a jail facility in another county. The main focus was on the computation of the reimbursement for transferred prisoners. The present statute allows for reimbursement "equal to the average per diem per capita inmate cost at the county jail." The proposal was that the Department of Corrections establish "a per diem per capita inmate cost at the county jail." This concept was included in LD 723 in regards to the transfer of prisoners to state facilities.

SUMMARY

The bill allows county jails to release a prisoner who was imprisoned for 8 days or more at any time on the last day of the prisoners imprisonment. At present, prisoners must serve out the full term of days and hours. Giving jails the flexibility to release prisoners at any time on the last day will allow the jail to administer releases in a more efficient manner. Prisoners serving less than 8 days would still have to serve the full term of days and hours.

SUMMARY

Under present law, a person detained in a county jail following a detention hearing or committed to jail as an order of disposition for an offense committed as a juvenile must be housed with juveniles, regardless of the person's age at the time of detention or thereafter. This bill amends the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 15, section 3203—A, subsection 7, paragraph A, and section 3314, section 1, paragraph H, to give the Juvenile Court the discretion to order the committed person to be housed with adults for any period of detention occurring after the detainee has reached 18 years of age. Unless the Juvenile Court expressly orders otherwise, however, the detainee will be kept in the juvenile section even after reaching 18 years of age.
