SUMMARY

LD 991 proposed the following changes in the law regarding low-level radioactive waste disposal:

- * Exempted from assessment for administrative costs of the authority waste generators who will not need to use any waste disposal facility.
- * Removed the cap of ten million dollars as the limit Maine Yankee has to pay toward the construction of the facility.
- * Removed the limit of one million dollars a year which can be collected for the cost of operation of a low-level radioactive waste disposal facility and set a new fee schedule for collecting that money. The current law has a fee schedule that is based 50% on volume and 50% on radioactivity. The new fee schedule would have recognized the additional difficulty and expense in dealing with more radioactive waste by basing assessments more heavily on radioactivity.
- * Proposed the development of an assurance fund, if adequate insurance could not be obtained so that the citizens of Maine would be reimbursed for any damage this facility may cause.
