The bill decreases the amount of cocaine and heroin possessed to allow a presumption of trafficking to 14 grams or more of cocaine and 4 grams or more of heroin.

Committee Amendment "A" (S-183) makes a technical correction.

SUMMARY

The bill would increase the sentencing class for 3rd and subsequent prostitution-related offenses to a Class C crime.

Committee Amendment "A" (H-338) replaced the text of the bill. It makes aggravated promotion of prostitution a Class B crime, and increases the class of crime for 2nd and subsequent convictions of prostitution and engaging a prostitute to Class D crimes.

Senate Amendment "A" to Committee Amendment "A" (S-259) deletes unnecessary language concerning the date of the offense.
