All Adopted Amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H-584 or S-222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action is listed to the right of the title. If final House and Senate action differ, both are listed. Committee Reports and Floor Action are abbreviated as follows:

LD 1256 An Act to Provide a Notification Mechanism for the Expiration of Motor Vehicle Registration

<u>SUMMARY</u>

The bill requires the Secretary of State to give 30 day written notice to persons before their registration expires. A fee sufficient to cover the cost of notification may be charged at the time of registration.

<u>SUMMARY</u>

In general, vehicles and loads wider than 102 inches (8 ft, 6 inches) are prohibited (29 §1701). But, DOT or the municipality or county in charge may issue permits to carry wider loads on an emergency basis or for stated purposes such as moving pneumatic-tired heavy equipment. The bill would prohibit wide loads on the Carlton Bridge in Bath during rush hours (6:00-8:00 a.m. and 3:00-5:00 p.m.).

SUMMARY

BURKE FARNSWORTH

The bill requires new school buses purchased after September 1991 to be equipped with seat safety belts for use by all passengers. Existing buses will be required to install seat safety belts within a 5-year period.

flashing red light and a siren. The bill would extend the privilege to ambulances using a flashing light but not a siren, if the condition of the patient prevents use of the siren.

The bill also extends the use of red flashing lights to emergency rescue squad and ambulance personnel on private motor vehicles the same as volunteer rescue squad and ambulance personnel can under §1367-B(4)(a).

SUMMARY

This bill directs the Commissioner of Transportation to cause a pedestrian walkway to be constructed over Interstate 295 in Portland to connect the University of Southern Maine parking lot with Deering Oaks Park. The cost would be \$600,000 from the Highway Fund for design and construction.

SUMMARY

The study would be conducted by a 7-member commission including 1 senator; 1 representative from the Transportation Committee, 1 from the Judiciary Committee, 1 from the State & Local Government Committee, 1 from the Executive Department, 1 from MMA and 1 from the Governor's Municipal Advisory Council. The study is to report to the State & Local Government Committee by December 1, 1989, and that committee report to the Legislature by January 1, 1990.

The State and Local Government Committee reported out favorably LD 383 which deals with this issue by authorizing municipalities to maintain existing private roads if: not obstructed to the public and if the municipality has adopted standards for road construction. The municipality may assess the landowners but may also use municipal funds for this purpose. The Law Court issued an advisory opinion (printed in the House calendar of June 14, 1989, declaring much of that bill unconstitutional.

CA (H-386) The amendment modifies the study to report to the Legislature rather than a joint standing committee. It also changes the membership to 1 Senator and 2 Representatives from the Joint Standing Committee on Transportation and 1 Senator and 1 Representative from the Joint Standing Committee on State and Local Government. The study will focus on the questions whether there is any municipal authority and responsibility for maintenance of private roads when there is and when there is not a public easement.

HA (H-488) resolves conflicting provisions on the chair.
