SUMMARY

This bill would have established a process for strengthening the technical service potential of Maine's 16 soil and water conservation districts. Currently, state agencies lack the necessary delivery system to provide for adequate assistance to landowners and municipalities on techniques effective in the management of soil and water resources.

Under this bill, distribution of information and assistance to help municipalities and landowners implement new state-mandated policy and programs would have been accomplished through the use of the districts at the local level. The bill would have established a fund to support the delivery of technical services by conservation districts.

The committee amendment (H-231) would have changed the name of the Technical Assistance Fund to the Technical Assistance Account. The amendment also added an appropriation and a fiscal note. The bill was indefinitely postponed although some additional funding for soil conservation districts was included within the Part II Budget, PL 1989, c. 501.

SUMMARY

This bill would have required the Board of Environmental Protection to divide the state into waste management regions. The board would have further been required to site, develop, operate and close solid waste landfills as needed by the state. The board would have been allowed to accomplish siting, development and operation of these facilities through contracts with private parties. The committee voted not to pass this bill, instead incorporating the basic concept of a state role in facility siting and ownership into its comprehensive solid waste legislation, LD 1431.
