SUMMARY

This bill revises the laws pertaining to identifying, reporting, preventing and controlling communicable diseases or conditions that are injurious or that threaten the health of the people of the State.

The bill makes some substantive changes in the treatment of communicable diseases and sets forth the standards of proof for various proceedings in order to give more explicit guidance to the courts in adjudicating these matters. In addition to reenacting the current provisions with minor changes relating to rulemaking, this bill expands the rulemaking authority of the Department of Human Services to include the establishment of procedures to be used in detecting, contacting and treating individuals having or reasonably believed to have a communicable disease.

SUMMARY

This bill contains the minority recommendations of the Commission to Study the Status of Nursing Professions in Maine. It is similar to LD 1324 except in the following ways:

It restricts loans under the Maine Choice Program to nursing students. It does not extend the Health Occupations Training Program to health care worker other than nurses, It does not permit delegation of _CNA supervision to LPNs. It does not require the Maine Health Policy Advisory Commission to monitor the recommendations of the Commission and it does not require the establishment of a nursing and practice center.
