SUMMARY

LD 1603 proposed that the State relinquish its title to 22 1/2 acres of land in Bangor and convey the State's title to Gerald and Elizabeth Briggs. The Briggs' purchased the property in 1969, and Penobscot County which did not have a clear title gave the Briggs a deed to clear the title. The deed is void because the county cannot waive state ownership in land.

The State had come into possession of the property in 1926 which was used as security for a bond for a person to appear in Penobscot County Superior Court. The person never appeared and the State purchased the property at auction. Following State purchase of the property, the owners continued to remain on the property and finally sold it. The property was subsequently sold several times.

The Committee Amendment provides that the State's interest would be conveyed to the Briggs' at the cost of the State's initial investment (\$272.99) and associated transfer fees.
