### SUMMAR Y

At the end of the First Regular Session, the 114th Legislature transferred a portion of the budget and 4 positions in the Office of Public Advocate from the General Fund appropriation to a new dedicated account, funded pro rata by utilities doing business in Maine. In fiscal year 1989–1990, this Public Advocate Regulatory Fund supported nearly 1/2 of the office's activities on behalf of utility ratepayers at the Public Utilities Commission. The Fund automatically expired on June 30, 1990. This bill sought to renew the Public Advocate utility assessment and the Public Advocate Regulatory Fund for the 2nd year of the biennium and to restore positions in the personnel services and the expert witness budget for the Public Advocate which were inadvertently reduced when the Public Advocate Regulatory Fund was established. The cost of this assessment is to be funded by utility customers as part of the rate-making process at the Public Utilities Commission. This bill was referred to the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs.

#### SUMMARY

MARSH

This bill, as amended (S-507), requires consumer-owned water utilities to provide notice of the sale of certain utility lands to the Public Utilities Commission, the municipality where the land is located and a local newspaper. The Public Utilities Commission will provide notice to parties who may be interested in the land for conservation or recreational purposes. Interested parties will have 8 months to procure financing to purchase the land unless that time period is waived by the Public Utilities Commission. The municipality in which the land is located has an assignable right of first refusal to purchase that land. The sale of land by a utility under this section may not be considered an unreasonable or imprudent action by the water district trustees solely by reason of sale of the land at a price below market value. The title was amended to reflect the changes in the committee amendment.
