Please give us your suggestions and comments on these summaries and tell us of any inaccuracies.

Allow pneumatic-tired Class A and B special mobile equipment to move by special permit.

Require written certification in writing by the Commissioner of Education to DMV that an applicant for school bus drivers endorsement satisfies the commissioner's existing training, physical, mental and moral requirements.

Limit the prohibition on obscuring items on registration plates to those items necessary for identification purposes.

Allow suspension, revocation or assignment of points by DMV based on offenses in other provinces on the

Make notice of suspension or revocation sufficient if delivered by hand, or sent by regular mail, to the last address filed with DMV.

Deem notices of suspension for provisional licenses and OUI received 5 days after mailing unless returned by the postal service.

Make operating a vehicle with an expired certificate of inspection a traffic infraction rather than a misdemeanor.

Allow a for-hire motor carrier to satisfy the motor vehicle liability insurance requirement for obtaining a State operating permit with insurance from a company that is licensed only in another state, if the insurance company presents an indemnity bond.

Limit the exemption of car or van pools from the Maine Highway Transportation Act to those incidental to the livelihood of the owner and operator, and require that they file proof of insurance with DMV, rather than the Bureau of Insurance.

#### SUMMARY

The committee amendment (S-573) addresses the same issues, as the bill, but replaces it, adds an emergency clause and will:

-repeal a requirement for the owner to remove the inspection sticker upon private sale of a motor vehicle.

-delay a revised commercial vehicle inspection law to July 1, 1990, when new federal regulations take effect, and allow federal commercial vehicle inspections to be accepted in Maine.

-simplify procedures for adoption by reference of federal regulations for transportation of hazardous materials and for motor carrier safety by exempting them from the Maine Administrative Procedure Act, while requiring filing, publication and availability.

-exempt rear windows in limousines from tinting restrictions applicable to other passenger vehicles, and allow commercial installers to certify tinted glass installed by others.

-make the owner or operator, rather than the police, responsible for returning to the State Police the out-of-service sticker on an overweight vehicle after the overweight has been corrected.

-clarify that a person may have a motor vehicle inspected more frequently than annually, if desired.

-reenact the altered vehicle registration and inspection requirements with a new effective date of March 1, 1991.

SUMMARY

Present law requires emergency vehicles to use both a flashing light and a siren in order to gain the right-of-way. The bill would make the use of the siren optional.

The committee amendment (H-837) limits this to ambulances. It also requires a departmental review, led by the Department of Public Safety, of special privileges for emergency vehicles.

### **SUMMARY**

The Travel Information Advisory Council was established in 1981 to advise the Commissioner of Transportation on highway signs. The bill adds a Senator and a Representative to the council. It also requires the Council to study the operation of present law and possible alternatives and report to the Legislature in 1991.

The committee amendment (H-761): makes the legislative members temporary, during the study period from now until 1991; changes one seat to the garden clubs instead of the Keep Maine Scenic Committee, which no longer exists; sets staggered dates for all the terms, and adds an emergency clause and a fiscal note, costs absorbed.
