SUMMARY

This bill sought to amend the charter of the Bangor Water District to require Bangor City Council approval of any district decisions to enter into, renegotiate, amend or renew contracts to provide or sell water outside the district. It would have also added a referendum clause to the charter, whereby if 5% of the district's voters sign a petition, a decision of the water district must be put to referendum.

SUMMARY

Current law gives the Public Utilities Commission authority to resolve disputes concerning the construction of sewer and drain pipes across railroad tracks. This bill originally sought to give municipalities final authority over the method and time of completion for those projects. The bill, as amended (H-982), adds language to the current law which does not change the intent of the current law. The title was amended to reflect the changes in the committee amendment.

SUMMARY

This bill originally sought to require a utility, when it sought to take property by condemnation for construction of a water treatment facility, to show that no other property is suitable for that facility. The bill, as amended (H-934), requires water utilities to give written notice to those persons who own or abut land that is being considered for acquisition for the purpose of constructing a water treatment facility and to the municipality in which the land is located, and to the public by means of a newspaper of general circulation in the area in which the land is located. The title was amended to reflect the changes in the committee amendment.
