SUMMARY

This bill consolidated current littering laws and enhanced the penalties for illegal disposal of litter. The bill provided for the forfeiture of vehicles used to illegally dispose of more than 500 pounds or more than 100 cubic feet of litter for a commercial purpose.

Committee Amendment "A" strikes out the bill's provisions regarding forfeiture and provides that vehicles used to illegally dispose of more than 1000 pounds or more than 100 cubic feet of litter are subject to forfeiture under the forfeiture procedures in 15 MRSA chapter 517. The amendment also makes several changes in the bill for the purpose of clarification.
