administering contracts with service providers and adopting rules governing the coordination of alcohol and drug abuse prevention programs which are binding on all agencies. The ADPC statute (Title 22, chapter 1601) is repealed and the structure of the OADAP is amended to leave the administration of the Driver Education Evaluation Program, the information clearinghouse and treatment facility licensing responsibilities within the Department of Human Services. All other OADAP functions are transferred to the new Office. The bill also undedicates the alcohol premium fund and requires that all revenues raised by the alcohol premium tax be deposited in the General Fund.

Committee Amendment "A" (S-639) allows the Director of the Office of Substance abuse to delegate contracting responsibilities to various agencies. The amendment also clarifies that the Department of Education must coordinate its substance abuse education programs with the Office to the fullest extent possible within the requirements of federal funding, repeals language pertaining to involuntary commitment of substance abusers and requires that the Legislature appropriate general fund monies to the Office which are at least equal to the revenue received from the alcohol premium tax during the previous year. In order that the necessary appropriations and allocations required by the bill be accomplished without undue complications, the amendment also makes the bill an emergency and establishes an effective date of July 1, 1990.

Senate Amendment "B" (S-713) to Committee Amendment "A" removes the emergency preamble and adjusts the appropriation section of the bill to reflect an over-allocation of alcohol premium tax revenues.
