LD 101 An Act Amending the Potato Branding Laws

SUMMARY

This bill proposed amending the enforcement section of the potato branding laws. Currently, a person who refuses access to an inspector is guilty of a violation. As amended, refusal of access would not have been a separate violation. An administrative search warrant could still have been obtained under the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 7, section 13.

This bill would have also prohibited the inspection of potatoes in transit.

SUMMARY

The original bill would have prohibited the sale and distribution for human consumption of milk products or meat products produced by cows that had been administered the growth hormone bovine somatotropin, commonly known as BST.

Committee Amendment "A" (H-897) replaced the original bill. It restricts the use of biosynthetic bovine somatotropin, known as BST, to medical and research purposes. It prohibits anyone except a veterinarian or a supervised veterinarian's assistant from administering biosynthetic BST. The presence of biosynthetic BST on a dairy farm results in loss of the farm's operating permit if the restrictions on biosynthetic BST have been violated.

The Committee amendment provided for repeal of these restrictions on January 1, 1993.

House Amendment "D" (H-992) adds a definition of research to the laws concerning biosynthetic bovine somatotropin, or BST. The amendment requires a veterinarian administering BST for research purposes to submit documentation on the research to the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources and requires the department to provide copies of such notices to dealers. The amendment also extends the repeal date to February 1, 1993.
