JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE BILL SUMMARIES

AUGUST 1991

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H - 584 or S - 222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

SUMMARY

This constitutional resolution proposed a constitutional referendum that, if passed, would have required that the Legislature reimburse local units of government for any expenditures over \$100,000 incurred by the local unit as a result of the implementation of any state law or rule.

SUMMARY

This bill transferred the administration of the deferred compensation program to the Maine State Retirement System, placed the Executive Director of the Maine State Retirement System on the Advisory Council on Deferred Compensation Plans and reduced the number of employee representatives on the advisory council to 3. Additionally, the bill transferred appointing authority for the 3 employee representatives to the Board of the Maine State Retirement System.

Committee Amendment "A" eliminated the transfer of administration to the Maine State Retirement System, but retained the change of membership on the advisory council and changed the title of the bill. The amendment returned appointing authority to the Governor, but required that the appointed employees be recommended from the 3 major groups that represent state employees: the Maine State Employees Association, the American Federation of State and Municipal Employees and the Maine State Troopers Association.

SUMMARY

This bill prohibited the State Purchasing Agent from purchasing any car or light duty truck for use by the State, with the exception of vehicles used for law enforcement, unless the vehicle met minimum fuel efficiency standards.

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Committee Amendment "A" replaced the original bill and:

- 1. Expanded the exemption from the mileage requirements to vehicles purchased for other special use purposes as designated by the State Purchasing Agent;
- Required that leased vehicles be subject to the same mileage requirements as purchased vehicles; and
- 3. Established separate mileage requirements for light duty trucks that were lower than the mileage requirements for cars.

LD 312 An Act to Clarify the Powers and Duties of the Department of PUBLIC 129 Administration, through the Bureau of Purchases

SUMMARY

This bill required the Bureau of Purchases to include political subdivisions and school administrative districts in determining the amount of storerooms necessary to store supplies.

Committee Amendment "A" brought the language of the bill into conformity with the description of administrative school unit in the Maine Revised Statutes, Title 20-A, section 1, subsection 26 and added a fiscal note.

SUMMARY

This bill would have made the State, through the Maine Turnpike Authority, financially responsible for ambulance and authorized emergency response vehicle services provided on controlled access highways.
