An Act to Protect the Safety of Motorcycle Passengers

SUMMARY

This bill would have provided that motorcycle passengers may only ride on the rear of the permanent, regular seat, or on a separate seat attached to the rear of the regular seat.

SUMMARY

This bill would have lowered the age requirement to obtain a driver's license from 16 years to 15 years, 6 months. It also provided that the following three requirements be met before the issuance of a license or an instruction permit to a minor:

- 1. Authorization from a parent, guardian, spouse over 18, or if none of these exist, an employer for unemancipated minors (this is the same as current law);
- 2. Proof that the minor is on the honor roll for that grading period prior to application and a signed statement from a guidance counselor that the minor is capable of being a responsible driver (new requirement); and
- 3. Completion of a driver's education course (current law already requires this for those applying for an instruction permit and for those under 17 years of age applying for a license).

SUMMARY

This bill would have required the Secretary of State or a designee to notify holders of motor vehicle registrations as to when those registrations are due to expire. The bill would have required the notice to be sent no more than 60 days and no less than 30 days before the expiration.
