JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE BILL SUMMARIES

AUGUST 1991

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H - 584 or S - 222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

LD 556 An Act Concerning Reimbursement for Certain Medical Services P & S 11 as Special Education Services

SUMMARY

This bill would have required the Department of Education to include the treatment by optometrists of vision problems in elementary and secondary school students by means of behavioral training as an allowable special education service. Behavioral optometry includes exercises and training to develop visual skills such as focusing, following moving objects, turning the eyes together and depth perception.

The Committee Amendment (H-147) replaces the original bill and directs the Department of Education to conduct a study of the cost, feasibility and means of including certain medical services as reimbursable special education costs when necessary to provide an appropriate education. The department will report to the Joint Standing Committee on Education by January 15, 1992.

SUMMARY

This bill revised the composition of the Board of Trustees of the Maine Technical College System by removing 2 ex officio members and replacing members who serve on other boards with members from the general public.

Committee Amendment "A" (H-100) added language directing the Governor to consider statewide geographical representation and gender equity when appointing board members.

Senate Amendment "A" (S-75) added technical language to avoid a conflict with Public Law 1991, chapter 20, also enacted in the First Regular Session of the 115th Legislature.

SUMMARY

This bill would have amended the Arts Commission statutes to require that selection of artists and writers to participate in commission programs must be the decision of local non-profit agencies, not the Commission. After consideration, the committee granted leave to withdraw to the bill and requested the Commission to consider several issues raised by proponents of the bill and to report back to the committee. The issues which the Commission will address are: (1) attaining an appropriate mix of types of artistic disciplines represented in the programs; (2) providing appropriate representation of commercial and noncommercial artists in the programs; and (3) assuring an open process in the development of eligibility criteria, the selection of members of peer review committees and the selection of artist to participate in the program. The Commission will report to the committee by December 31, 1991

SUMMARY

The original bill appropriated funds to the Finance Authority of Maine to increase the number of primary care physicians for rural and underserved areas of Maine by reestablishing the medical contract program, dropped in 1981, at the University of New England College of Osteopathic Medicine in Biddeford.

Committee Amendment "A" (H-165) removed the emergency preamble, the appropriation and the emergency clause. It added a provision stipulating that new positions at a college of osteopathic medicine not be purchased by decreasing the number of allopathic positions currently purchased. It also added a fiscal note to the bill.

LD 663 An Act to Provide Access to School Facilities and Programs ONTP for Home-instruction Students (By Request)

SUMMARY

Under current law, home-instruction students may only participate in school programs with the explicit approval of school authorities. This bill would have directed the Department of Education to designate a range of regularly offered nonacademic programs to be made available to home-instruction students by the school administrative unit within whose jurisdiction they reside. The bill would have standardized the nonacademic program opportunities available to home-instruction students. The bill also required that school administrative units provide access for home-instruction students to academic facilities.
