An Act to Promote Plumbing Efficiency

SUMMARY

This bill would have enacted plumbing efficiency standards for new plumbing fixtures installed as part of new construction or renovation to help conserve water supplies and energy. Basic standards for toilets, shower heads and faucets are proposed. Residential construction would have had to be in compliance with these standards by July 1, 1992; commercial construction, by July 1, 1993.

Exemptions would have been allowed for repairs that do not involve plumbing, noncompatible plumbing systems, residential buildings on private wells and for special-purpose plumbing fixtures. Municipalities would have had to enforce these provisions to be eligible for pollution abatement grants.

In addition, this bill proposed to require water utilities to undertake water conservation and education programs, to make conservation fixtures available to their consumers and to educate their users on the hazards of disposing of inappropriate wastes in their toilets.

This bill would have prohibited low-level radioactive waste generators and operators of storage or disposal facilities from transporting any low-level radioactive waste generated during the production of energy more than 10 miles from the site at which it was generated.

SUMMARY

This bill would have created a "Political Subdivision Assistance Fund" to provide loans, grants and technical assistance to assist political subdivisions in complying with federal and state environmental laws. The fund was to be a dedicated account, capitalized from civil penalties assessed under the general penalty provisions of the Department of Environmental Protection, Title 38, section 349.
