JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE BILL SUMMARIES

AUGUST 1991

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H - 584 or S - 222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

However, it was not the intent to remove the boards of visitors of other institutions. This bill reestablishes the boards of visitors, except for the Augusta Mental Health Institute and the Bangor Mental Health Institute.

Committee Amendment "A" (S-38) makes technical changes to clarify the intent of the bill and adds a fiscal note.

SUMMARY

This bill makes the director of the Bath Children's Home an appointed position that serves at the pleasure of the Commissioner of Mental Health and Mental Retardation, making it consistent with the chief administrative officer positions of the Department's other residential facilities.

Committee Amendment "A" (S-37) adds a "grandfathering" provision, allowing the current director of the Bath Children's Home to remain a classified employee. The amendment adds a fiscal note to the bill.

LD 743 An Act Regarding Continuing Education for Administrators of Boarding Homes

SUMMARY

This bill requires administrators of boarding homes to obtain 12 hours of relevant training each year. It makes the training a condition of licensure as of January 1, 1992 for boarding homes with more than 6 residents and as of January 1, 1994 for all boarding homes. The Department of Human Services is required to reimburse a percentage of the training costs based upon the percentage of state-supported residents in each home.

LD 744 An Act to Enable Retail Stores to Bottle and Sell Water on the Premises

SUMMARY

Public water systems are regulated by the Department of Human Services, and bottling regulations require space and equipment that make bottling and selling water extremely difficult for small retail stores. This bill excludes retail stores from the definition of "public water system" if the retail stores purify and bottle water from an existing "public water system," such as a municipal water supply, and sell it on the premises. Such stores are thereby placed outside the jurisdiction of "public water system" regulations.

Committee Amendment "A" (H-119) replaces the original bill. Rather than exempting retail stores from water regulations altogether, it limits regulation to an annual inspection of the purifying equipment by the Department of Agriculture and regular water samples to be submitted to the Department of Human Services. The amendment also adds a fiscal note to the bill.

SUMMARY

This bill requires the Department of Human Services to develop an alternate practical permanent plan in addition to a rehabilitation and reunification plan that provides alternatives to rehabilitation and reunification for children 5 years of age or younger who are taken into the Department's custody. This allows the department to be prepared to act more expeditiously if reunification efforts fail. The bill also requires that, within 10 days of being taken into custody, children must have physical examinations and, if considered appropriate by the examining physician or nurse practitioner, must have psychological assessments within 30 days.

Committee Amendment "A" (H-202) removes the bill's requirement that alternate practical permanent plans be developed and amends the section in the bill that would have required that children taken into custody receive medical and psychological exams within certain time frames. The amendment requires only that appointments for those services be made within the time frames.

SUMMARY

This bill prohibits hospitals and other health care institutions licensed in the State from denying employment or privileges to podiatrists simply because they are podiatrists.

Committee Amendment A (H-192) was reported by a majority of the committee. It clarifies that the bill does not prohibit a hospital from refusing an application for privileges based upon a person's ability or credentials or from closing its medical staff for the performance of any particular service. It also clarifies that the bill does not require a hospital to offer any new service.
