All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H - 584 or S - 222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

#### **SUMMARY**

Under current law, local school districts are responsible for conducting evaluations of state wards, while the State pays for any special education services that are provided pursuant to the evaluation. Local school districts are occasionally unable to provide adequate and timely evaluations of state wards (e.g. for transient and homeless students). This bill would have required the Commissioner of Education to convene a pupil evaluation team for a state ward when requested to do so by the Department of Human Services.

#### SUMMARY

This bill authorizes school administrative units to use locally developed tests to permit students to take tests for credit for school courses. The tests must be designed to require demonstration of mastery over the courses' subject matter. A student who passes the test for a course must be granted academic credit and excused from the attendance and other requirements of that course. The test would be available to any student who has not yet taken the course, who has failed the course, or who would otherwise take the course as part of a summer or other remedial program.

The Committee Amendment (H-115) clarifies that the testing-out option applies to any school course and that the decision on whether credit is to be granted is up to school officials. The amendment also corrects a reference to secondary school students and adds a fiscal note.

#### **SUMMARY**

This bill requires public school buildings to be ventilated according to standards established by the American Society of Heating, Refrigeration and Air Conditioning Engineers, Inc. as defined in ASHRAE Standards 62-1989, Ventilation for Acceptable Indoor Air Quality.

The amendment addresses air quality in existing schools by requiring school officials to operate and maintain currently installed mechanically driven heating, ventilation and air-conditioning systems in accordance with building standard codes on air quality in existence when the school was built or the

system installed. School units are also required to inspect and, if necessary, repair air quality systems annually and to make their records regarding inspection and repair available to the public. The amendment also corrects an incorrect reference to ASHRAE standards in the original bill.

#### **SUMMARY**

This bill would have required that if the total budget article fails to receive a majority vote at referendum, the board of directors must consider the prior year's budget to be the approved budget for the next school year.

#### **SUMMARY**

The original bill limited the sale by a school administrative unit of any real property or personal property valued at more than \$5,000 without authorization by the voters. In units where 2 or more municipalities help fund education, a majority of voters in each municipality must approve the sale.

Committee Amendment "A" (H-114) replaced the original bill and required a school board to establish a policy for disposing of personal school property valued at \$5,000 or more and required the school board to notify member municipalities of the planned sale.
