This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H - 584 or S - 222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

**LD 1379 An Act to Clarify the Payment of Fees for Testing Private Water Supplies**

**ONTP**

**SUMMARY**

This bill would have required the Department of Human Services to adopt by rule maximum exposure guidelines for contaminants in drinking water supplies. These levels were to be set based on an assessment of the best scientific information on contaminant's risk to human health and economic reasonableness.

**LD 1414 An Act to Provide Certain Municipalities with an Exception to the Waste Facility Siting Laws**

**SUMMARY**

This bill would have allowed municipalities to obtain variances from the transfer station setback requirement.

Committee amendment "A" (H-213) replaced the bill. The amendment allows a transfer station that is not on an island to be located within 250 feet of an abutting property boundary if the municipality obtains the written permission of all owners of property within 250 feet of the proposed handling site. Current law allows a transfer station that is not on an island to be within 250 feet of an abutting property boundary only if the department determines the abutting property to be a conforming use.

**LD 1427 An Act to Facilitate Recycling Programs for Aseptic Packages and Milk Cartons**

**SUMMARY**

This bill would have temporarily repealed the current ban on aseptic packages in the State, in order to allow the aseptic package industry an opportunity to undertake the development of a recycling program for its product, the "juice box". The committee unanimously rejected the bill after no convincing evidence was presented to support the technical or economic feasibility of recycling aseptic packaging.
