LD 1443 An Act to Improve Records Management in Local Governments

SUMMARY

This bill would have established a Local Government Records Management Improvement Fund to assist the Local Government Records Board in implementing existing standards and improving records management at the local level. It would have also increased the real estate transfer tax rate by 2¢ to provide funding for municipal records management. The distribution formula was revised so that there is no loss to the counties, the General Fund or the Housing Opportunities for Maine Fund; the counties, the General Fund and the Housing Opportunities for Maine Fund would have each received a small net increase in funds.

This resolve would have established the Commission on Effective Information Systems in State Government, to study the information management systems currently used throughout State Government and propose a more effective information management system. This was one of 8 bills containing the recommendations of the Commission on Maine's Future.

SUMMARY

This resolve would have:

- 1. Directed the Office of Comprehensive Land Use Planning to submit a 4-year work plan and budget to the Governor and the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations by December 31, 1991.
- 2. Directed the Maine Science and Technology Commission to develop a strategy for facilitating technology transfer to business and industry.
- Directed the University of Maine System to submit a proposal for establishing a degree program and curriculum for land use planning by June 30, 1992.
- 4. Directed the Department of Conservation to prepare a comprehensive strategy to foster communications and positive relations between landowners and those who use private land for recreation.

- 5. Directed the Governor to develop a proposal for consolidating state agency efforts to acquire land for outdoor use.
- 6. Directed the Governor to develop a proposal and funding package for a public education program about the State and the changes the State has experienced and the implications of those changes.

SUMMARY

This resolve provided funds by placing a surcharge on some laboratory fees for hiring an independent management firm to conduct a complete evaluation of the Department of Human Services.

Committee Amendment "A" removed the surcharge on fees that was designed to fund the study. A fiscal note providing General Fund monies to finance the study was also added to the resolve.

SUMMARY

This bill would have created a finance committee for Cumberland County with the authority to prepare a proposed budget, hold hearings on its proposal and transmit a final budget to the county commissioners. The county commissioners could have changed the budget only upon a unanimous vote, which the finance committee could have rejected by a 2/3 vote.
