This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H - 584 or S - 222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

An Act to Establish a Grading System for Maple Syrup LD 1739

SUMMARY

This bill establishes new grading standards for maple syrup. The new standards are similar to the standards for maple syrup in Vermont. Committee Amendment "A" (S-185) changes the grade label "Fancy Grade" to "Grade A Light Amber." It changes the grade label "Grade B" to "Grade A Extra Dark Amber." It changes the density requirement from 66.9° Brix to 66.0° Brix. It also adds a density requirement to the standards for Grade A Medium Amber and adds a fiscal note that was omitted in the original bill.

SUMMARY

The original bill specified that at least one member of the Animal Welfare Board represent a state licensed animal shelter, and at least one member represent an unlicensed humane society. The bill also proposed an advisory committee to aid the board in developing rules concerning the licensing of animal shelters, pet shops, boarding kennels and kennels.

Committee Amendment "A" (S-305) replaced the original bill. It changes the composition of the Animal Welfare Board by: adding an 11th member; specifying that at least one member represent a state-licensed animal shelter and at least one member represent a licensed kennel, boarding kennel or pet shop; and giving the Commissioner of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources or the commissioner's designee voting rights on the board. The bill as amended specifies that one board member receive compensation from the board's special revenue account. It requires that the board report annually to the Joint Standing Committee on Agriculture. The amendment added an emergency preamble, an emergency clause and a fiscal note to the bill.

LD 1861 An Act to Expand the Membership of the Animal Welfare Board

SUMMARY

This bill proposes to abolish the Animal Welfare Board's status as an independent board. The board would once again be an agency of the Department of Agriculture, Food and Rural Resources. It proposes to expand the membership of the Animal Welfare Board from 9 to 11 voting members and specifies that by March of 1992 at least two members must represent state licensed animal shelters. The bill provides for the

commissioner to appoint an executive director for the board and for the board to recommend candidates to the commissioner. The committee requested that this bill be carried over and the board's status as an independent agency be reconsidered after review of the annual report required by LD 1859. LD 1958 An Act Regarding Simulcasting of Harness Racing

SUMMARY

This bill provides that the Harness Racing Commission may proceed under the emergency rule—making procedures of the Maine Administrative Procedure Act without finding that an emergency exists if the only rule changes are regarding the number of simulcast races that may be broadcast by a licensee on the same day as a regular track meeting.

The bill also restores to the Harness Racing Commission general rule-making powers regarding simulcasting. The general language was deleted from the law when the language regarding simulcasting of entire racing cards was enacted by the 114th Legislature. The bill makes the language restoring the rule-making powers retroactive to the date when they were accidentally repealed.

House Amendment C (H-706) clarifies that the races being simulcast are horse races and that the commission is allowed to proceed under emergency rule-making without a finding of emergency for 1991 only.

Senate Amendment B (H-392) adds a fiscal note to the bill.
