## JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE BILL SUMMARIES

#### AUGUST 1991

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H - 584 or S - 222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

## An Act Concerning Limitations on Actions for Penalties

#### **SUMMARY**

The bill would repeal 14 MRSA §858, which covers a now uncommon situation, where a citizen could act as a private prosecutor and obtain all or a portion of a forfeiture or penalty. If a person authorized to bring such a suit failed to act, the State could then intercede if it wished and bring suit within 2 years. Violators of various regulatory provisions are now attempting to utilize the law to bar the State from prosecuting violations that occurred more than 2 years prior to the lawsuit filing, although private prosecution is not allowed. The bill would prevent this argument in the future.

#### **SUMMARY**

The bill would require court reporters to be present in 4 circumstances:

- All criminal proceedings;
- 2. All civil proceedings before a jury;
- 3. All civil proceedings without a jury but in which a party requests a Court Reporter and notifies the court that a reporter is required at least 48 hours before the proceeding; and
- 4. All civil proceedings without a jury in which the court determines that there is good cause for the reporter to be present.

#### **SUMMARY**

The bill corrects errors and inconsistencies in Maine laws.

Committee Amendment "A" (S-328) strikes out two sections that were already corrected in other bills.

House Amendment "A" (H-635) strikes out three sections that were already corrected in another bill.
