## JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE BILL SUMMARIES

## AUGUST 1991

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H - 584 or S - 222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

LD 1853 An Act to Require Campuses of the University of Maine System to Obtain the Approval of Local Planning Boards, Sanitary and Sewer Districts and the Public Utilities Commission before Undertaking New Projects

#### SUMMARY

This bill proposed to make the University of Maine System subject to local zoning and land use restrictions and procedural requirements. The bill further proposed to require the University to submit for approval or denial plans for new facilities to the trustees of potentially affected sewer or sanitary districts and to the Public Utilities Commission.

#### SUMMARY

This resolve proposes to direct the Public Utilities Commission to work with the State Planning Office, the Public Advocate, the State's electric utilities and customer's of electric utilities to study and propose mechanisms to emphasize electric rate minimization (as opposed to bill minimization) in the development of conservation and demand-side management programs within the framework of least cost planning.

#### SUMMARY

This bill authorizes an increase in the debt limit of the Jackman Water District from \$800,000 to \$1,250,000. This increase is designed to permit the district to conform to the requirements of the federal Safe Drinking Water Act for the filtration of surface water.

#### **SUMMARY**

This bill creates the Plymouth Water District. This bill is subject to approval by referendum in the

district. The committee amendment (H-530) exempts from review by the Public Utilities Commission funds received by the district from the Department of Environmental Protection, unless commission review is requested by the department. The district will probably receive money from the department to install a new water system because the existing area water supplies have been contaminated. The House amendment (H-606) corrects an error in a reference cited in the committee amendment.

## LD 1901 An Act to Create the Morrill Village Water District

#### SUMMARY

This bill creates the Morrill Village Water District. This district is intended to be the successor to the Morrill Water Company. This charter grants the district the authority to purchase the plant, properties, franchises, rights and privileges owned by the Morrill Water Company. The charter also grants the district a special power of eminent domain to acquire these same assets, except cash assets and accounts receivable. This bill is subject to approval by referendum in the district. The committee amendment (H-531) amends the emergency preamble of the bill.

## LD 1931 An Act to Amend the Berwick Sewer District Charter P & S 38

#### SUMMARY

This bill, which was suggested to be referred to the Committee on Utilities but was acted upon without reference, amends the Berwick Sewer District Charter to provide that the Berwick Sewer District may be dissolved by a majority vote of the voters voting at a municipal election. This bill requires the Town of Berwick to assume the district's assets, liabilities and responsibilities in the event the district is dissolved.

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
