# JOINT STANDING COMMITTEE BILL SUMMARIES

### JULY 1993

This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

The committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H-584 or S-222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

#### **SUMMARY**

This bill adds the Medomak River to the statutory classification of major river basins and gives a portion of the river the water quality classification of A.

The committee amendment (H-45) moves the boundary between the new Class A waters and the existing Class B waters upstream on the Medomak River to the Wagner Bridge Road in Waldoboro, Maine.

#### SUMMARY

This bill would have added environmental considerations to the list of factors considered by the Public Utilities Commission in least cost planning.

The minority report of the Joint Standing Committee on Energy and Natural Resources (H-30) would have appropriated \$100,000 in each fiscal year to the Public Utilities Commission for consulting and rulemaking activities related to the bill.

#### **SUMMARY**

This bill would have prohibited the Department of Environmental Protection from investigating a complaint or allegation of a violation of a land use law or rule, including those pertaining to protected natural resources and shoreland zoning, unless the complaint or allegation is first referred back to the local code enforcement officer and the code enforcement officer then refers the matter back to the department. The bill would also have granted enforcement authority of the protected natural resources laws to local code enforcement officers.

Committee amendment "A" (H-28) replaced the bill. The amendment allows a certified code enforcement officer to enforce the natural resources protection laws if that person is authorized by a municipality to represent the municipality in District Court and is certified by the Commissioner of Human Services as familiar with court procedures. The Maine Rules of Civil Procedure, Rule 80K govern proceedings in District Court for prosecutions of land use violations and permit persons who are not attorneys to prosecute land use violations if they are authorized by the municipality and certified as being familiar with court procedures.

The amendment is permissive and does not require any municipal enforcement of the natural resource protection laws or any additional certification or training of code enforcement officers. The amendment does not limit or affect the ability or the duty of the Department of Environmental Protection to enforce environmental laws.

The amendment also encourages the department and municipalities that choose to exercise local natural resource protection laws enforcement authority to discuss options for resolving violations of those laws in a manner that ensures compliance with laws of the State while promoting cooperation between state and municipal government.

House amendment "A" (H-39) added a fiscal note to the committee amendment.
