LD 232 An Act to Increase the Earnings Cap of a Disability Retirement Benefit

SUMMARY

The disability retirement laws currently contain an earnings cap of \$10,000. After a recipient reaches the cap, the disability benefit is reduced dollar for dollar. This bill would have increased the cap to \$20,000 and provided for future annual indexing according to the Consumer Price Index.

SUMMARY

This bill ensures that there is no reduction of earnable compensation and creditable service for teachers on released time spent performing the part-time duties of the office of president of a certified bargaining agent. The released time provision must be negotiated as part of a collective bargaining agreement and appropriate withholdings must be made to the Maine State Retirement System by the school administrative unit on the part-time president's earnings.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" (H-369) provides that the retirement costs related to released time to perform the function of the president of the collective bargaining agent must be paid by the bargaining agent or the school. The retirement costs attributable to payments for the unfunded liability will be paid by the State.

SENATE AMENDMENT "A" (S-362) adds a mandate preamble to the Committee Amendment and replaces the fiscal note.

SUMMARY

This bill would have changed the laws governing mandatory coverage requirements for participating local districts within the Maine State Retirement System so that the local district could exclude or withdraw classes or groups of employees from mandatory coverage. The classes of employees excluded would have to be covered either by mandatory local pension provisions or Social Security withholdings. The bill would also have required that participating local districts determine whether part-time, seasonal and temporary employees will participate in the local district or be exempted.
