This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

The committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H-584 or S-222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

<i>VETO SUSTAINED</i>	<i>Legislature failed to override Governor's Veto</i>
<i>UNSIGNED</i>	<i>Not signed by Governor within 10 days</i>
<i>DIED ON ADJOURNMENT</i>	<i>Action incomplete when session ended; bill died</i>

This bill would have provided for motor vehicle registrations to expire on the last day of the owner's birth month. Firms or corporations would have designated a month to be used as a "birth month" for registration purposes. It also would have provided for certificates of inspection to expire on the last day of the month in which the registration expired.

SUMMARY

This bill would have permitted the Department of Transportation to authorize a pilot project allowing local service clubs to sell refreshments at the information center at Yarmouth. The bill also would have required the department to provide rules, an assessment and recommendations for the expansion or the discontinuation of the pilot project.
