This document is a compilation of the bill summaries prepared by this office for the Joint Standing Committees and Joint Select Committees of the Maine Legislature. The volume is organized alphabetically by committee; within each committee, the summaries are arranged by LD number. A subject index is provided at the beginning of each committee's summaries.

The committee report or reports, the prime sponsor for each bill and the lead co-sponsor in each house if one has been designated are listed below each bill title. All adopted amendments are listed, by paper number (e.g., H-584 or S-222), together with the sponsor for floor amendments. Final action on each bill is listed to the right of the title. Various types of final action are abbreviated as follows:

This bill would have made a change in the definition of campaign "expenditure" to clarify what factors must be considered in determining whether a publication should be excluded. The factors were based on those used by federal courts to interpret federal law similar to Maine's.

SUMMARY

Currently, municipal or county officers may deny an application for a license to sell liquor based on noncompliance of the licensed premises with local zoning or land use ordinances if those ordinances are not directly related to liquor control. This bill would have amended the law to remove that limitation.

LD 561 An Act to Clarify the Laws Concerning Beano and Bingo

SUMMARY

This bill would have amended the beano laws in the following ways.

- 1. The bill would have changed the definition of winner-take-all round and would have set out the distribution of proceeds to the State, the licensee and the participants.
- 2. The bill would have defined "unlimited paper game."
- The bill would have amended the law regarding high-stakes beano to include Fridays as part of weekends.
- 4. The bill would have authorized 4 rounds of winner-take-all beano per occasion rather than one round.

- 5. The bill would have authorized licensees to conduct one unlimited paper game per occasion.
- 6. The bill would have raised the limitations on prizes, from \$400 to \$500 for a single prize and from \$1,400 to \$2,000 for total prizes on any one occasion.
- The bill would have increased by one hour the period during which games of lucky seven may be conducted.
- 8. The bill would have also enacted general rules of operation. Specifically, the bill would have:
 - A. Allowed the use of "u-pick-em" tally cards;
 - B. Allowed a separate nonsmoking room or area to be set up;
 - C. Regulated the calling of numbers in locations where monitors are used;
 - D. Allowed an operator calling numbers to be on a different floor level from participants;
 - E. Allowed the use of bonus cards:
 - F. Allowed a licensee to play for a player to allow that player to use the restroom;
 - G. Regulated the use of electronic card managers or aids;
 - H. Allowed electronic verification of tally cards; and
 - I. Allowed for the arrangement of numbers on cards in any pattern that can be rotated.
